<u>Prof. Huang Jing</u> is Director of Centre on Asia and Globalisation (CAG) at Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy (LKYSPP). As an internationally recognized expert on Chinese politics, China's foreign relations and security issues in Asia-Pacific, Huang has written two books and numerous journal articles, book chapters, policy papers, and op-eds on Chinese politics, China's foreign policy, the military, US-China relations, and security issues in Asia-Pacific. His book, Factionalism in Chinese Communist Politics (Cambridge University Press, 2000), won the prestigious Masayoshi Ohira Memorial Prize in 2002.

Prof.Huang also serves as a Senior Overseas Economic Analyst for China's Xinhua News Agency. This appointment has obliged him to provide advice to China's policy-makers on major policy issues. Before joining the LKYSPP, He was a Senior Fellow at the John Thornton China Center at the Brookings Institution (2004-2008). He also taught at Harvard University (1993-94), Utah State University (1994-2004) and Stanford University (2002-2003). Huang received his PhD in Political Science from Harvard University, and his MA in History from Fudan University.

<u>Prof. Liu Yawei</u> is the director of the China Program at The Carter Center since 2005. Yawei is also the associate director of the China Research Center based in Atlanta (since 2007). He was president of the United Society of China Studies (2010-2011). He is a senior fellow at the Chahar Institute, a non-governmental think tank based in Beijing. He is visiting professor at the Institute of Advanced Studies in Social Sciences at Fudan University (since 2008) and at the School of International Affairs and Public Administration at Shanghai Jiaotong University (since 2010). He was appointed a senior fellow at the Halle Institute for Global Learning in 2011 and adjunct faculty member at the Department of Political Science at Emory University in Atlanta in 2012.

He is the founding editor of <u>www.chinaelections.org</u> which went online in 2002 and forced offline in April 2012. It is now accessible at <u>www.politicalchina.org</u>. <u>Prof. Luo Yong</u> has Ph.D. in Economics and is now working at the Institute for Urban and Environmental Studies, Chinese Academy of Social Sciences. His research expertise lies in environmental economics, sustainable urban and regional development, ecological cities and healthy cities, etc. He has published 8 books and more than 80 papers, took charge of more than 10 national and provincial research projects and more than 50 relevant local research projects, and published monographs and articles with a total of more than 2 million Chinese characters. He has made speeches at the 1st Economy of China Forum, the UK Wilton Park Conference on China – China's Economic Growth and its Global Impact, and the 1st China Ecological Civilization Building Forum. He has been invited to participate in the national advisory group of academicians and experts. His works are mainly related to sustainable development of regional economy, sustainable urban development and other monographs theories such as spatial economics, regional economics and urban economics. Many of his works were chosen as excellent works on environmental economics in Chinese Academic Yearbook.

<u>Dr. Yu Xiaohong</u> is an Assistant Professor at the Dept. of Political Science, Tsinghua University. She received a B.A. in international relations and M.A. in comparative politics from Renmin University of China in 1999 and 2002, and a Ph.D. from Columbia University in 2009. Her research and teaching interests lie in comparative politics with a focus on Chinese politics, judicial politics, local governance and central-local relations. She is also the Associate Director of the Center for Local Governance at Tsinghua University.

<u>Dr. Zhang Aijun</u>, whose pseudonym is Mu Ran, is a Ph.D. supervisor and director of the Center of Political Studies Network at Liaoning Normal University. As an expert on Chinese politics, he worked in the Chinese University of Hong Kong, Columbia University, the Carter Center, Heilongjiang University, Dongbei University of Finance and Economics and other schools of political studies on the network, Micro-blog politics. His expertise lies in the study on the Theory of Democratic Politics and Network Political Studies. He published a hundred of articles in domestically influential journals, such as Du Shu, Studies on Marxism, and Studies in Dialectics of Nature, more than a dozen of which were written and edited by Dr. Zhang himself. Besides, some of his blogs were reproduced by print media like China Newsweek, The Economic Observer, Honesty Outlook, etc. His representative works and papers are *Comprehensive transformation of China, Power Restriction multidimensional sight, Study of Micro-blog political function, Tocqueville's tyranny equality Viewpoint*, and *Black and white double Variations*. Zhang received his PhD from Huazhong Normal University in 1997.





<u>Dr. Zhao Shukai</u> is a vice-secretary general of China Development Research Foundation of the State Council and a recognized expert entitled the State Council Special Fellowship. He has worked in the institute of rural policy studies under the CCP central committee from 1982 to1989 and started working for the Development Research Center of the State Council from 1990 as the director of the rural organization studies section. He has become the vice-secretary general of the China Development Research Foundation since 2011. He was invited to take the position of a visiting scholar at Duke University and Harvard University. He served as the vice secretary general of CCP Zhuolu county committee from 2003 to 2005. He has extensive consultancy experience with World Bank and the United Nations Development Program and published numerous books and articles in the field of rural governance in China.

Dr. Zhao Suisheng is Professor and Director of the Center for China-US Cooperation at Josef Korbel School of International Studies, University of Denver. A founding editor of the Journal of Contemporary China, he is a member of the Board of Governors of the US Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific, member of National Committee on US-China Relations, Research Associate at the Fairbanks Center for East Asian Research in Harvard University, Campbell National Fellow at Hoover Institution of Stanford University, Associate Professor of Political Science at Washington College in Maryland, Associate Professor of Government at Colby College in Maine and visiting assistant professor at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies, University of California-San Diego. He has authored and edited more than ten books. His most recent books are: China and East Asian Regionalism: Economic and Security Cooperation and Institutionbuilding; China and the United States, Cooperation and Competition in Northeast Asia; China-US Relations Transformed: Perspectives and Strategic Interactions; Debating Political Reform in China: Rule of Law versus Democratization; A Nation-State by Construction: Dynamics of Modern Chinese Nationalism. His articles have appeared in Political Science Quarterly, The Wilson Quarterly, Washington Quarterly, International Politics, The Hague Journal of Democracy, European Financial Review, The China Quarterly, World Affairs, Asian Survey, Asian Affairs, Journal of Democracy, Pacific Affairs, Communism and Post-Communism Studies, and elsewhere.

Prof.Zou Pingxue is the Vice Dean of Law School in Shenzhen University, Executive Deputy Director of The Basic Law of Hong Kong & Macau Research Center, Director of Constitutional Law and Human Rights Research Center. He is an outstanding constitutional scholar and Basic Law expert, and is a member of China Constitutional Law Study Committee, member of China Legislation Study Committee, Vice Director of Cross-straits Hong Kong & Macau Legal Research Professional Committee of China Constitutional Law Study Committee, Deputy Director of Guangdong Province Constitutional Law Study Committee. He has published over eighty papers in the fields of constitutional theory and institutional comparison, the People's Congress system, Basic Law of Hong Kong and Macau. His first treatise The Economic Analysis on Constitutionalism (1997) was the first one studying constitutionalism from economical categories in China. Famous jurist, Professor Xu Chongde wrote preface for this book and praised it 'very original and innovative'. Doctor Liu Nanping(刘南平) from Hong Kong University published 'The Marrow and Appearance of Doctorate Dissertation' in Peking University Law Journal and gave a rather high appraisal on this book. His second treatise of 'An Empirical Study on the Reform of Chinese Representative System' (2005) is commended as an excellent treatise on Chinese representative system by fellow scholars, and is listed as reference books for 'Special Research on China Mainland' courses by Taiwan University. He has collaborated another fourteen books, leaded over ten scientific research projects at national and ministerial level, and has received more than ten awards, inter alia, China Law Society Science Achievement Prize, Qian Duansheng Jurisprudence Achievement Prize, Guangdong Province Philosophy and Society Science Achievement Prize. His achievement on Basic law research has been cited and adopted by the Basic Law committee of the NPC Standing Committee, United Front Work Department of CPC Central Committee. Professor Zou has visited USA, Canada, Korea, Japan, Singapore and Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macau for academic conferences and researches. He studied in Wuhan University (1983-1990、1992-1995), and gained his Bachelor Degree of Law, Master Degree of Constitutional Law, and Doctor Degree of Constitutional Law. After that, he served in Shenzhen City People's Congress Standing Committee engaging in legislation and implementation research of special economic zones regulations (1995-2001), and involved in the drafting and research work of numerous regulations.
