



LKY SCHOOL 2019 EMPLOYMENT OUTCOMES

The Lee Kuan Yew (LKY) School of Public Policy National University of Singapore

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REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

This report highlights the career journeys of our 2019 graduates. The results are based on email surveys by our Career Services team, which were carried out in May and December 2019.

The LKY School saw 158 graduates in 2019, and 156 graduates (99%) responded to our surveys. Of the respondents, 85% reported having found employment within 6 months post-graduation, across 32 countries; 13% of respondents reported that they have found new jobs in Singapore and 23% indicated that they have secured a new job outside of Singapore.

Our 2019 graduates have found fulfilling work in line with their passions and values in the following sectors: Public (56%), Private (18%), Notfor-profit (14%), Multilaterals (6%) and Other organisations (2%). The remaining (6%) did not specify their organisations.




Overview (Includes MPP, MIA, MPA & MPM)

Based on the combined responses from graduates within the MPP, MIA, MPA and MPM degree programmes, 43% of them reported that they have returned to work for a previous employer. Of the respondents, 13% reported that they found a new job in Singapore and 23% reported that they found a new job outside Singapore.



By Sector

The combined responses from graduates within the MPP, MIA, MPA and MPM degree programmes indicated that majority of the respondents went to the public sector (56%) followed by the private sector (18%).





MASTER IN PUBLIC POLICY (MPP)


In the two-year Master in Public Policy (MPP) course, students focus on research and analysis, so that they can be effective in implementing, evaluating, and managing policies and programmes.


The MPP curriculum draws from economics, political science, and public management. A key component of the course is the Policy Analysis Exercise, where students undertake a public policy or management study for a client in the public, private, or not-for- profit sector. Their role is to conduct primary research and carry out in-depth analysis relating to an actual problem faced by their client, in order to offer policy recommendations.


CLASS OF 2019

68 out of 69 graduates responded to the graduate employment survey in 2019. Of the 68 respondents, 78% reported that they found employment. Of those who responded that they found employment, 18% indicated that they have returned to work for their previous employer. 22% reported that they found a new job in Singapore and 31% reported that they found a new job outside of Singapore.







CLASS OF 2019







CLASS OF 2019


CLASS OF 2019


