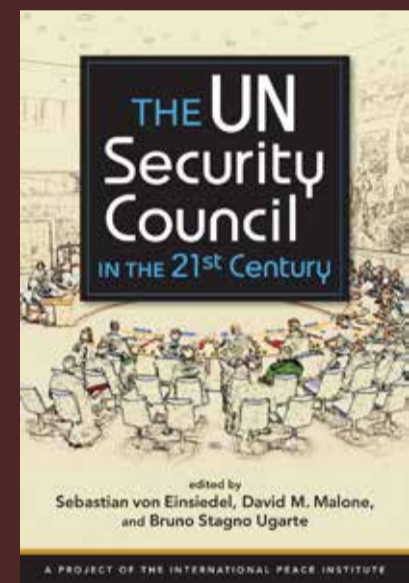


PANEL DISCUSSION
