



► INTRODUCTION ◀



A notable achievement of Asian, African, and Middle Eastern emerging and developing countries is rising enrolments at both elementary and high school levels. Basic schooling is generally now available for almost every child. This quantitative achievement, however, masks a 'learning crisis' of poor educational achievement for a variety of reasons. These are poor infrastructure, outdated curricula and methods, and above all, ill prepared and poorly motivated teachers. The advent of the global economy makes the solution to this problem all the more urgent.

As each country struggles with its own internal issues of reducing budgets and shifting priorities, a clear vision is needed to prepare the young for the future and ensure economic growth and employment without which social stability will be endangered. Skills development and training is one usually underfunded and underdeveloped, but essential for employment and economic development. The policies and experience of some of the more innovative and determined countries bear valuable lessons, which is the aim of this programme.

► PROGRAMME OBJECTIVES ◀

Through an interactive and 'solution finding' programme, participants will:

- › Understand the causes for the 'learning crisis' and its consequences for socio-economic development
- › Examine, from a regional and country-specific perspective, policy and 'best practice' solutions to major education problems
- › Learn about the key principles that underpin relevant and effective education policy development and implementation
- › Understand the demands of the evolving and competitive global workplace and how to tailor curricula and pedagogy to meet these challenges
