Selina Ho is Assistant Professor and Program Chair (Master in International Affairs) at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy, National University of Singapore. She specializes in Chinese politics and foreign policy, with a focus on the politics of water and infrastructure. She is the author of Thirsty Cities: Social Contracts and Public Goods Provision in China and India (Cambridge University Press, 2019). She is currently working on a co-authored book manuscript, Rivers of Iron: High-speed Rail in Southeast Asia and China's Quest for Power, which is funded by the Smith Richardson Foundation. She has also published several peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters on China's international rivers. She was appointed a Global Futures Council Fellow with the World Economic Forum.

Selina received her Ph.D. from The Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), Johns Hopkins University, where she also received a Master's in International Public Policy (Honours). She graduated from the National University of Singapore with a B.A. in History (Honours). She was a Singapore public servant before joining academia.
