IPS to launch Singapore Chronicles

The **Institute of Policy Studies (IPS)** will launch a series of publications, written by Singaporeans recognised for their contributions to academia, public policy, and journalism, to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Singapore's independence next year.

Titled Singapore Chronicles, the series will comprise 50 books covering a wide breadth of topics from the fields of politics and governance, environment, arts and culture, society, and the economy. A stellar cast of authors will helm the series. They include Ambassador Chan Heng Chee; former Permanent Secretaries Peter Ho and Bilahari Kausikan; journalists Zuraidah Ibrahim and Godfrey Robert; food writer Sylvia Tan; academics Tan Tai Yong and Chua Beng Huat; and biologist N. Sivasothi. IPS Director Janadas Devan, IPS Special Research Adviser Arun Mahizhnan and IPS researchers Yap Mui Teng, Gillian Koh and Christopher Gee are also among the authors.

Each book in the Singapore Chronicles series will serve as a primer on one subject. The author will focus on key aspects of the subject, providing analysis and insight as well as a historical account. The series will be rolled out throughout 2015.

In conceptualising *Singapore Chronicles*, IPS - Singapore's only think-tank dedicated wholly to domestic public policy research - set out to record, explain and offer some insights into what makes Singapore, Singapore. The Institute chose to draw authors from among Singapore's recognised researchers, scientists, engineers, writers, and policy practitioners so that each volume in the series will give a sophisticated, yet concise overview of the specific subject. Explaining how IPS chose the subjects, IPS Director Janadas Devan said the aim was to cover "the philosophical to the prosaic, the fundamental to the expedient".

Said Mr Devan: "These subjects represent the multiple facets of Singapore's history, culture and living environment and they have shaped life as we know it in Singapore today. Each book in this series will be accessible and engaging. We hope Singapore Chronicles will be useful for young people and all those seeking to better understand the country."

ANNEX B – Author bios

Multiculturalism

Chua Beng Huat

Professor Chua Beng Huat is Provost Chair Professor at the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences in the National University of Singapore (NUS). He is the head of the Department of Sociology in NUS and Research Leader, Cultural Studies in Asia Research Cluster, Asia Research Institute. Prof Chua has researched and written extensively on multiculturalism, popular culture and urban planning in Singapore and Asia. He is the author of *Life is not Complete without Shopping* and *Structure, Audience and Soft Power in East Asian Pop Culture*. He is also a founding co-editor of *Inter-Asia Cultural Studies*.

Separation

Janadas Devan

Mr Janadas Devan is Director of the Institute of Policy Studies (IPS). Mr Devan previously spent 15 years at *The Straits Times*, having joined the paper in 1997 after teaching English in various institutions in Singapore and the US. He served as the ST's leader writer for many years, and wrote a weekly column on politics and economics as well as a column on language for *The Sunday Times*. In 2008, he became the editor of the paper's opinion pages, and in 2010, became the paper's Associate Editor. He left the paper in July 2012 on being appointed the Government's Chief of Communications at the Ministry of Communication and Information, a position he continues to hold.

Confrontation

Bilahari Kausikan

Mr Bilahari Kausikan is Ambassador-at-Large and Policy Adviser in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He is also Senior Fellow at the School of Social Sciences, Singapore Management University. From 2001 to May 2013, Mr Kausikan was the Second Permanent Secretary and Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He previously served in a variety of appointments including as Director for Southeast Asia, Director for East Asia and the Pacific and as Deputy Secretary for Southeast Asia. Mr Kausikan had also served as the Permanent Representative to the United Nations in New York and as Ambassador to the Russian Federation.

He retired from the Singapore Administrative Service in 2013.

Food Sylvia Tan

Ms Sylvia Tan is a renowned food writer. She has written for various publications such as *Mind Your Body* (a weekly health supplement of *The Straits Times*), the *Business Times, Her World, Women's Weekly* and *Wine & Dine*. She won a special Singapore Press Holdings newspaper award for excellence in 1995 for her Mad About Food column in *The Sunday Times*. She has published several well-received cookbooks: *Singapore Heritage Food*; *Mad About Food: The Cookbook*; and *Eat to Live: Healthy Asian Recipes*. Ms Tan was previously a newspaper editor overseeing the lifestyle, business and local news sections for the *Singapore Herald*, *New Nation*, *The Straits Times* and *The New Paper*.

Peter Ho

Mr Peter Ho Hak Ean is Senior Adviser to the Centre for Strategic Futures, a futures think-tank within the Singapore Government. He is also a Senior Fellow in the Civil Service College, an Adjunct Professor with the S Rajaratnam School of International Studies, and a Visiting Fellow at the Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy. Mr Ho holds several chairmanships, including at the Urban Redevelopment Authority and Singapore Centre on Environmental Life Sciences Engineering. He sits on several boards and advisory panels, and is a member of Statoil's Strategy Advisory Council, and the McKinsey Center for Government Advisory Council. Mr Ho was formerly Head, Civil Service, and served as Permanent Secretary in various ministries, including Defence and Foreign Affairs. He retired from the Singapore Administrative Service in 2010.
