







Overview of youths

15 - 35 years old

Approximately 1.04m youths, making up ~25% of our resident population

Youths are well-educated, compared to previous generations and to most of the world


Ranked almost top in the world for **upward mobility** in education, with nearly 6 in 10 adults attaining higher qualifications than their parents¹

Today, **more than 300,000** youths aged 25 to 34 have a university degree - this figure has **doubled** from two decades ago²

Back then, about 320,000 youths had secondary school education as highest qualification, compared to 32,000 today



Youths are generally satisfied with their job, even as priorities have shifted




Almost 7 in 10 young

Recognise the importance of lifelong learning, with **7 in 10** having plans to **upskill or reskill in the next 5 years**²

Top 5 areas affecting youth's mental well-being



Youths are more liberal than the general population, but priority is still on bread and butter

More **liberal** views in issues such as divorce, sex before marriage, and same sex relationships¹

Top youth issues needing more attention in the next one year²



Youths are getting married later, and views on marriage and parenthood are also shifting

Median age for first marriage¹:

30.6 in 2022 vs. 28.9 in 2002 for *men*

29.1 in 2022 vs. 26.2 in 2002 for *women*

Top three **pre-requisites** for parenthood²:

Having adequate employment benefits (78%)

Financial Stability (77%)

Having own home (75%)

More youths (aged 22-29) hold the belief that dating, marriage, and parenthood are **not essential** for a fulfilling life³



Youths are willing to contribute to society in different ways and remain civically engaged

Over 1 in 2 youths remain confident that they are prepared for the future, and over 2 in 5 continued to see sufficient opportunities to achieve their aspirations and have a good career in Singapore¹

4 in 5 youths participated in at least **one civic activity** in 2022^2
