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




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Responding as an evaluator

- Best practices
- People-centred processes +
- local values (distant & personal subjectivities)
- Acknowledgement of complexity
- Durational accumulation of knowledge & experience
- Mikhail Bakhtin's relationship of the self, others & society centripetal & centrifugal forces, time & space



Policies should engender governance, critical knowledge & professionalism

Governance (spaces, duration, research)

Open, conducive and nurturing safe spaces

Artists/cultural workers in transitional progressive roles

Acknowledgement of complexity & cultivation of complex knowledge.

Critical language

Support critical inner & outer dialogue.

'Top-down projects'

'drop-in facilitators'

'domesticated participation'

'standardised creativity'

Focus away from celebratory

Discuss embedded anxieties, contemporary uncertainties and power relationships

Develop competent in understanding and negotiating social relationships (of ego with different others)

Professionalism

Move away from cultivating consumption Be inclusive of everyday experience & uncertainties. Respect differences & dissent

Constructive intention & passion (ego-led) are necessary BUT not enough.

Acknowledge shortfalls, to relearn and acquire critical framework (concept-led, evaluative).

Be critical of bias & education.
