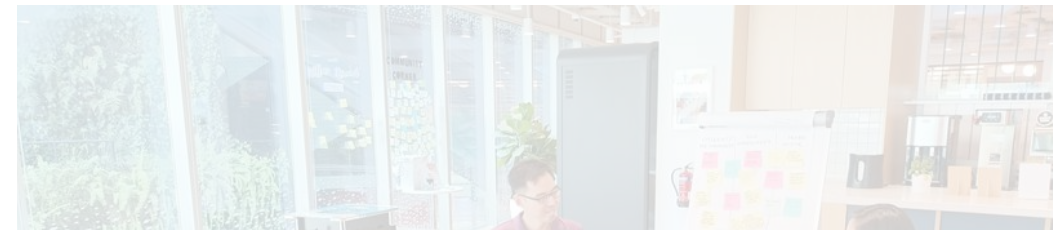
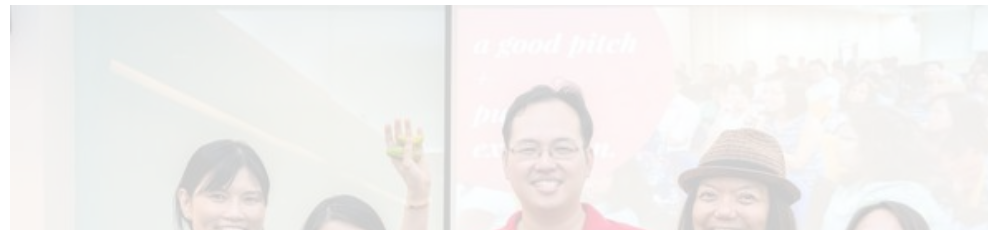

Riis was located in Queensbridge, Long Island City - the largest public rental flat neighborhood in the United States with 100 rental blocks, built in the 1930s

Context about New York City's budget, The People's Money and historical roots of Participatory Budgeting

Quick reference to terms used in this presentation

- New York City has 5 boroughs and is home to 8.4 million people
- Each borough has council districts, totaling 51 districts that make up the city council which enacts legislation and passes budgets
- The city elects a Mayor which oversees different city agencies



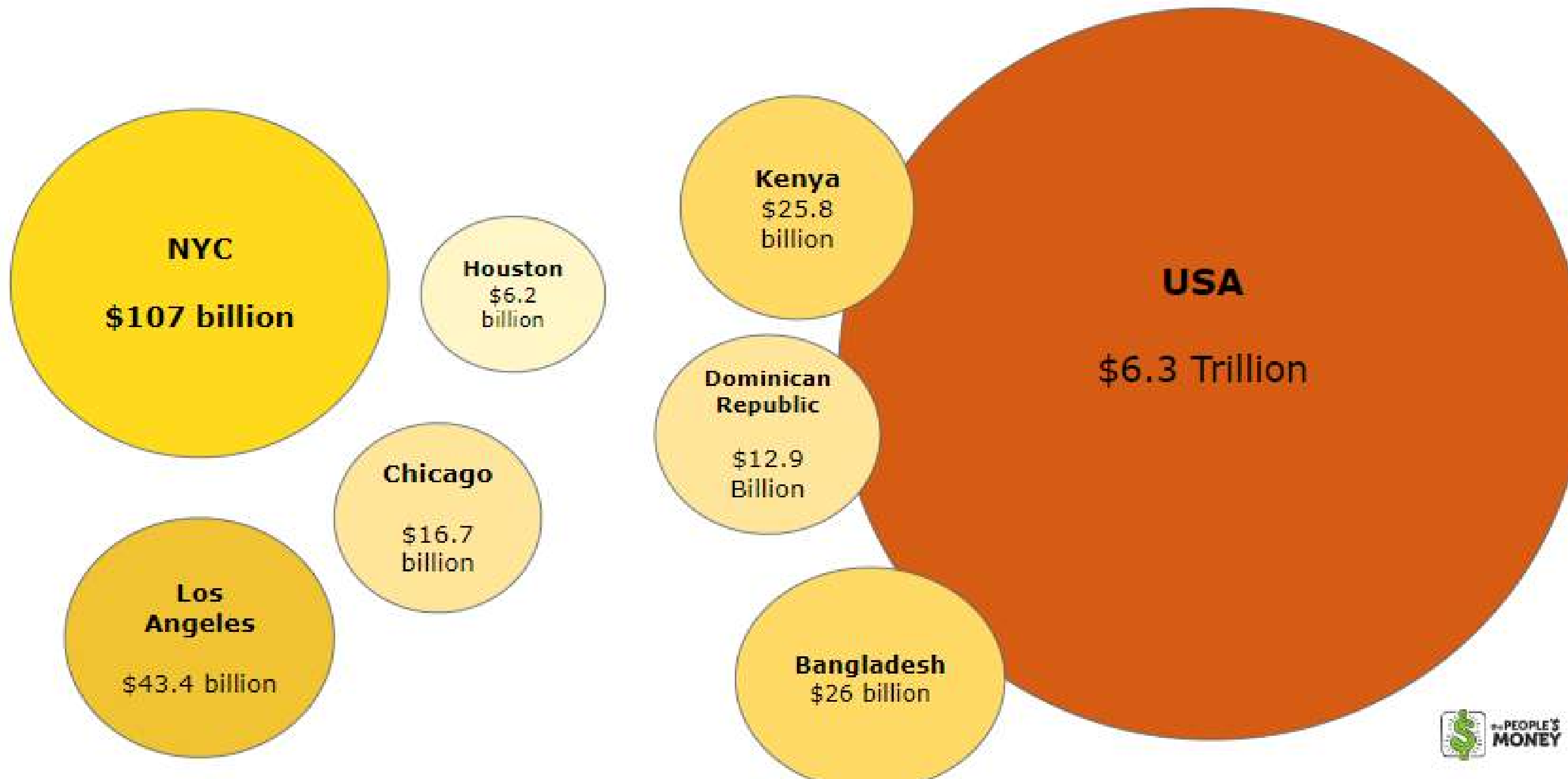


The New York Civic Engagement Commission aims to make civic engagement inviting and memorable

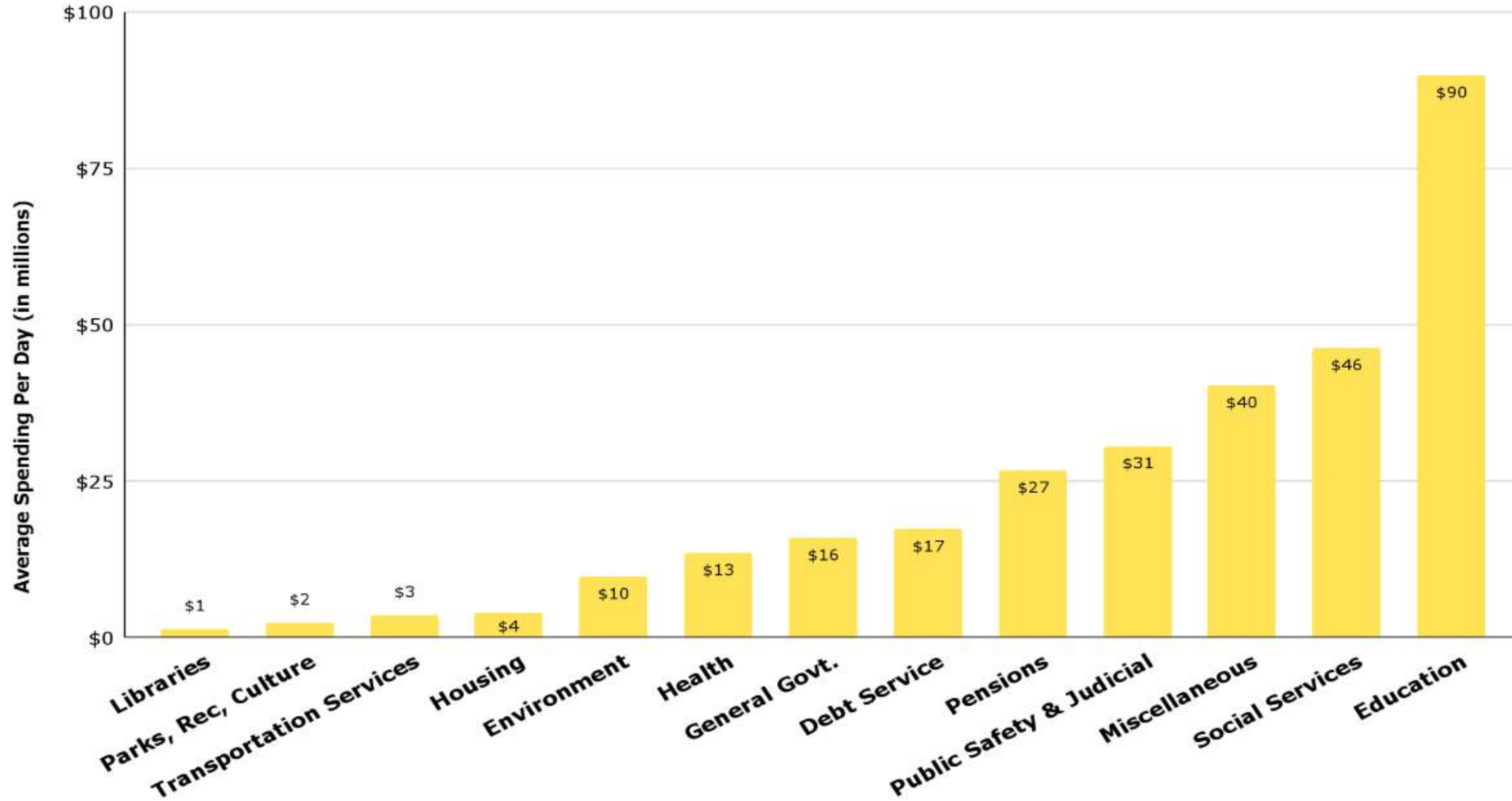
- Established by voters through a ballot in Nov 2018 that revised the NYC constitution
- Responsible for restoring civic trust and strengthening democracy by promoting inclusive civic participation for all New Yorkers



At \$107 billion, New York City has a larger budget than many US cities and even some countries! (similar to Singapore)



On average, New York City spends \$300 million a day



Participatory budgeting is a way for citizens to have a say in how the city spends its money and it has a long history

- Citizens are involved in the process of deciding how public money is spent
- Began in Porto Alegre in Brazil in 1989 and credited with shifting priorities to support poorest parts of the city
- Implemented over 11,000 times in cities all over the world



Launched by the CEC in 2022, The People's Money is a citywide participatory budgeting process which funds expense projects



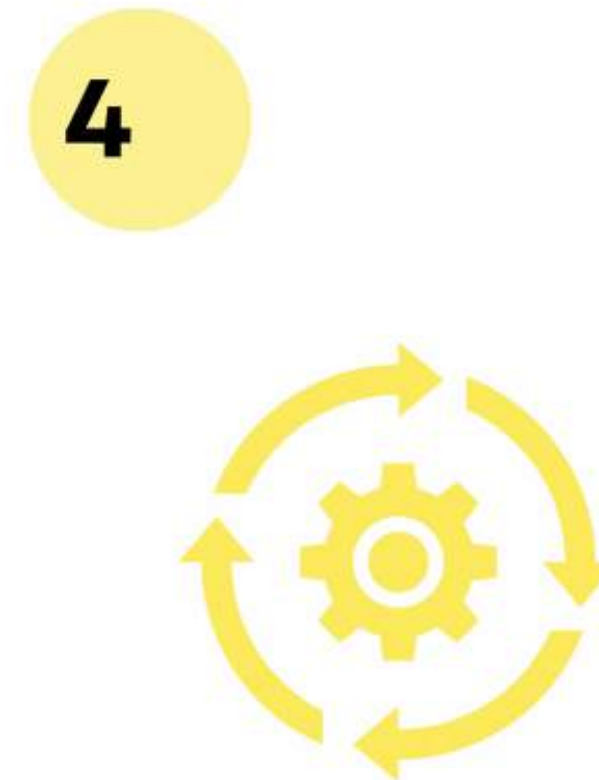

Similar to an RC - advocates for tenants to NYCHA



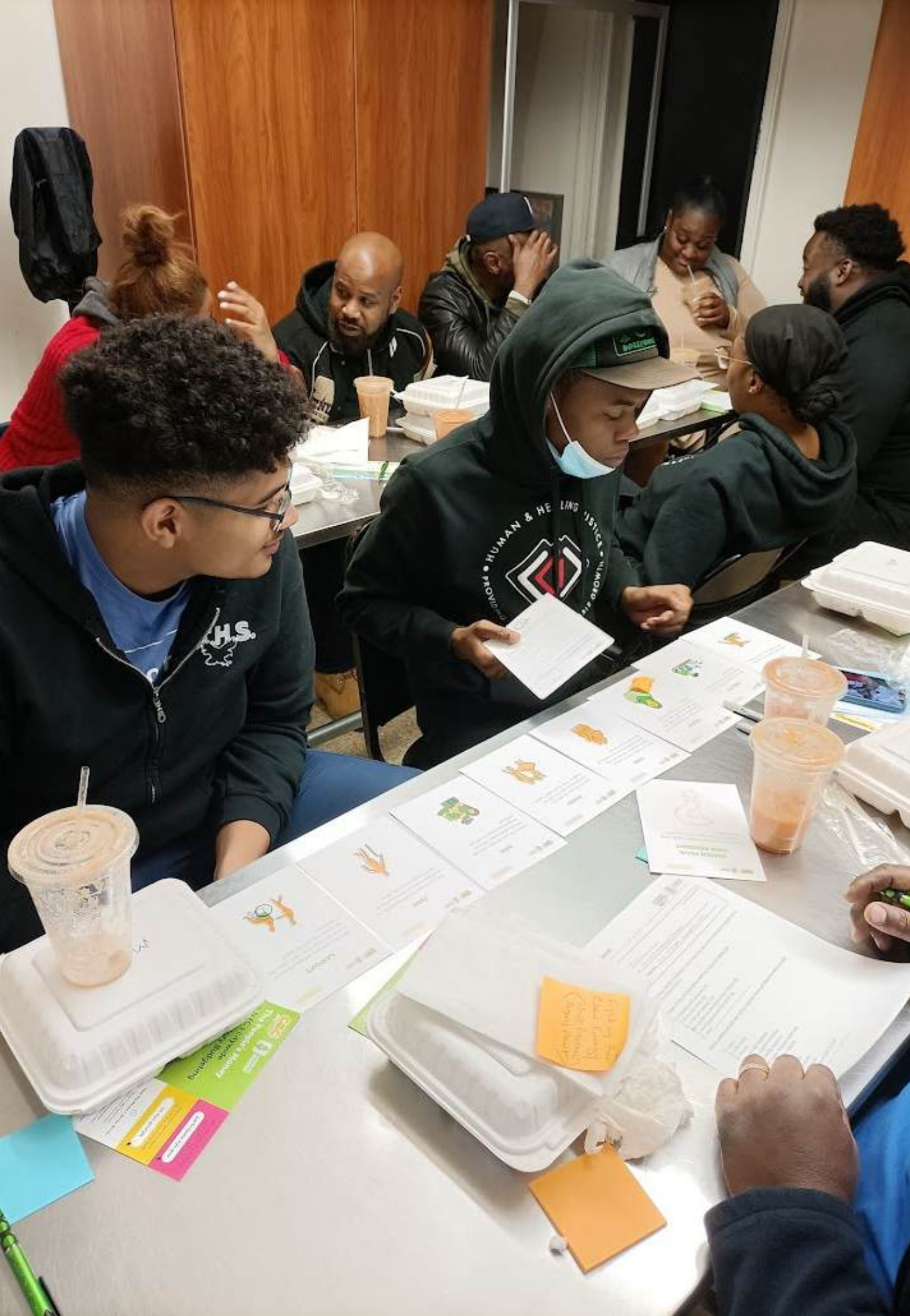

Idea Generation**



Phase 1: Idea Generation Workshops

- Comprise 20 - 25 participants for 2 hours. Participants we attract must live in a particular zip code (e.g. NY11101)
- Participants are split into smaller teams of 5 for the idea generation game

Round 1: Pick one type of city - each team selects one that they would like to work on from a set of 5 cards

You can combine resident cards, think of someone you know, or use your imagination!



Round 3: Read limiting factors - each team reads the 6 limiting factor cards to understand the constraints they have when brainstorming ideas



LIMITING FACTORS

MUST BE A PROGRAM OR SERVICE

The People's Money does not fund projects that involve construction, infrastructure repair, purchases of land, or any other physical public improvements.

Examples:

- ✗ Build a community center
- ✓ Create a program in an existing community center
- ✗ Install security cameras on a busy street
- ✓ Create a community safety workshop for residents on that street



LIMITING FACTORS

MUST NOT CHANGE POLICY OR STAFF NUMBERS

The People's Money cannot be used to change policy, or add staff to a city agency.

Examples about Policy:

- ✗ Change the public school curriculum
- ✗ Change the hours of library branches

Examples about Staff:

- ✗ Hire more police officers
- ✗ Increase salaries of public school teachers



LIMITING FACTORS

MUST LAST FOR ONE YEAR OR LESS

Projects will take place starting in July and will last through June of the next year.

Example:

- ✓ English language class for new immigrants for once a week for 9 months



Round 4: Pick one brainstorming method - each team reads the 4 brainstorm cards and selects one brainstorming method to come up with ideas



BRAINSTORM

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

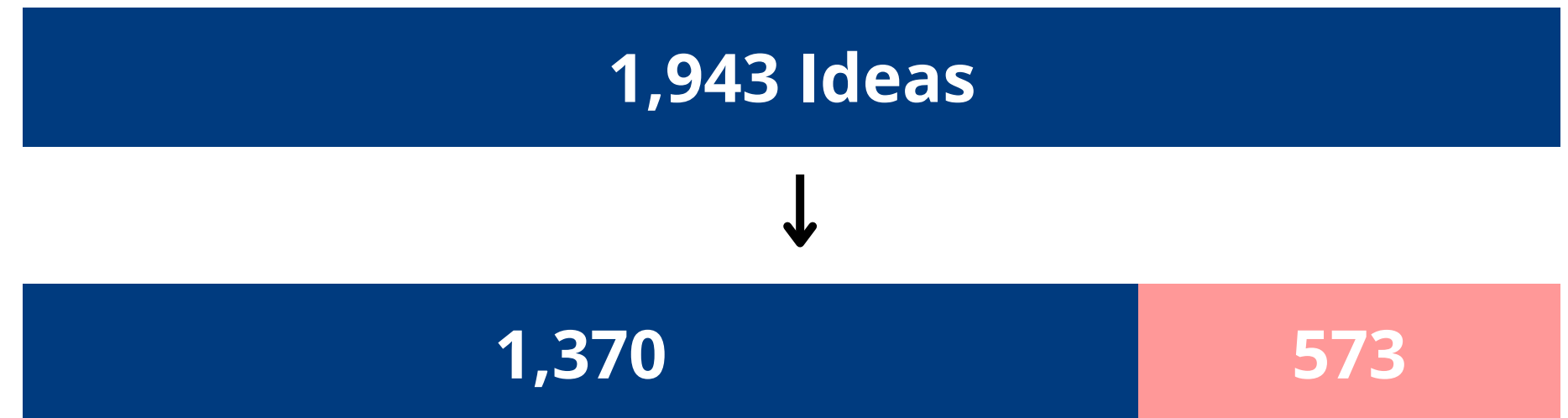


**Phase 2:
Project Development via the Borough
Assembly Committee (BAC)**

The CEC reviews all ideas submitted and disqualify or combine them before the Borough Assembly Committee gets involved

Step 1:

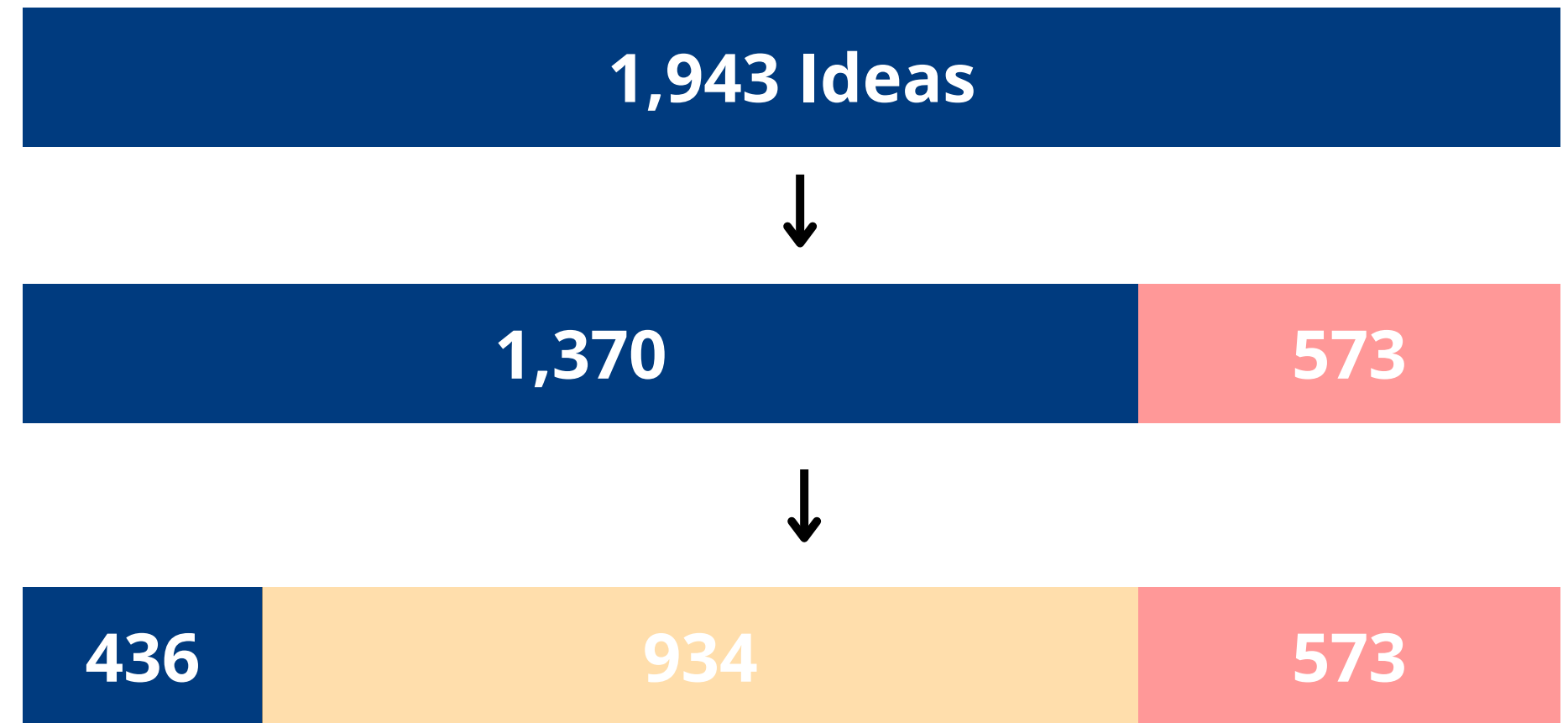
The CEC reviews and disqualifies ideas that don't fit the criteria



Disqualifying Criteria:

- Capital project
- Increase agency headcount
- Policy recommendation
- Incoherent
- Intolerant of others
- Too vague to understand

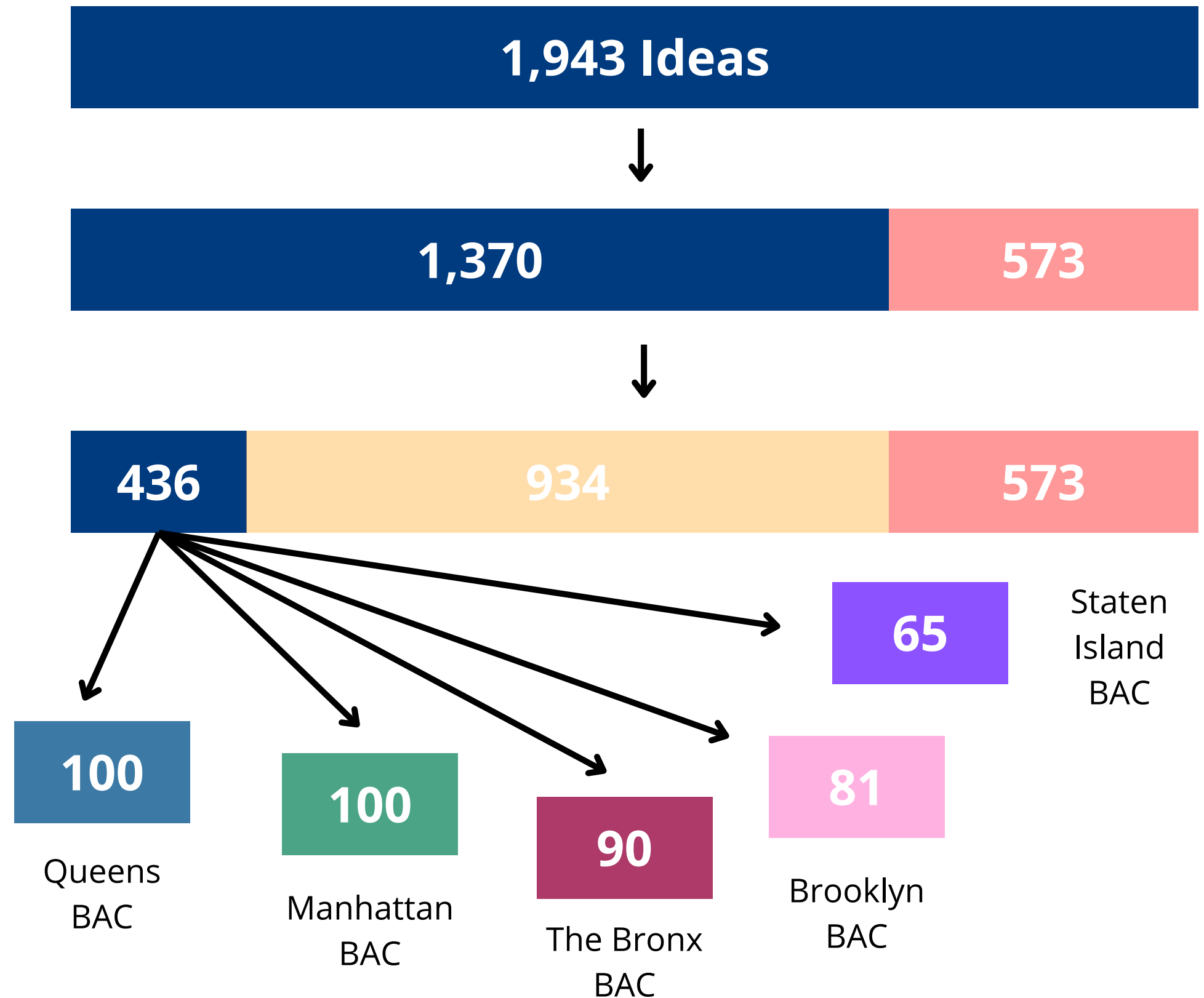
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Step 2:

The CEC bundles similar ideas together. In the end, 436 ideas move onto Phase 2

5 Borough Assembly Committees comprising 20- 25 residents matching the demographics of the borough will narrow down to 10 ideas to go on the ballot



Step 3:

Each BAC narrows down to 10 ideas that go onto the Borough's ballot

Community Issue:

A lot of parents, specially women in NY struggle to work worry free when they have kids at school, because first: a lot of people don't have anyone who can watch their kids and can't afford a daycare, second, they need to get a job that probably starts after 9:30 or 10:00 am, if the kid is not accepted in an afterschool program this type of parents have to work only 3 hours so they can go back pick up their kids, 3rd, days school is not working (that are a lot of days) they can't work because there isn't anyone to take care of the kids. 4th. They can't work an evening schedule because kids are at home and if they have a partner the partner is not home before the time they need to live the house. That's a big challenge!!

Idea Description:

We should create more programs whether they are at school or in other institution with a big capacity: a programable to teach the kids new skills, engage the kids in activities that develop their brain, that helps with homework, that has sports in it, that has a policy of not screen time while in there.

This program will include free bus transportation straight from school to the institution where the program will take place and back to school at the time the program finishes with the options of pickup at the place of the program too.

With this service parents will be able to work a worry free regular schedule knowing the kids are learning and enjoying at the same time and well protected.

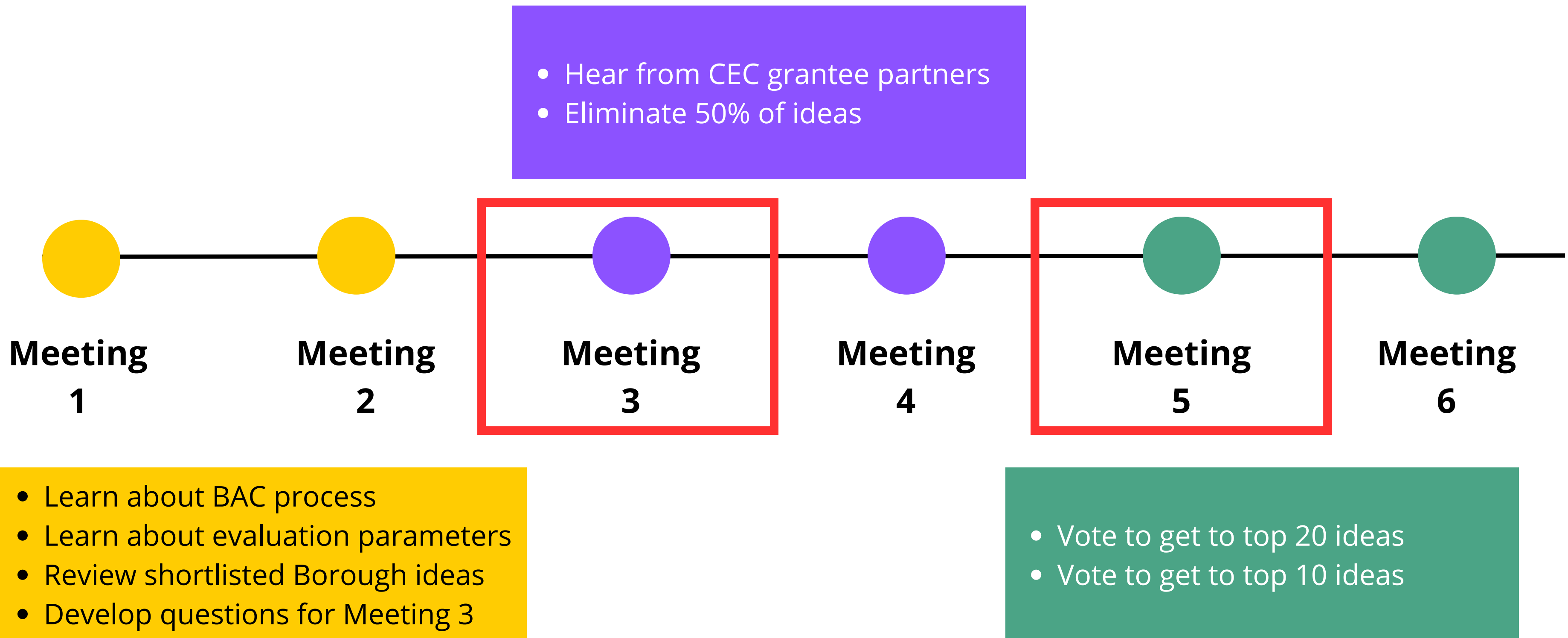

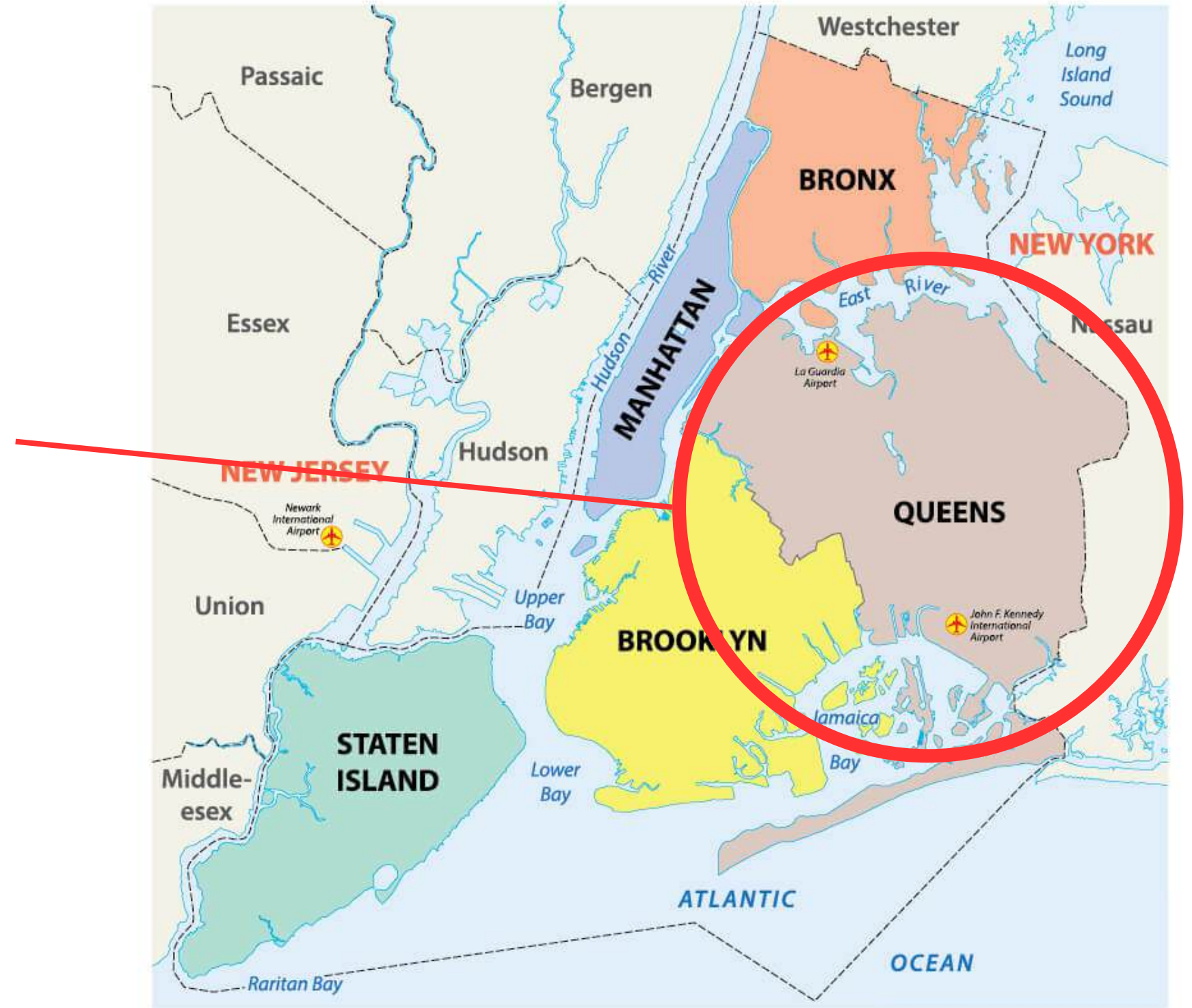
- Residents vote on their borough's ballot for projects they want to see funded in their borough
- They can vote online or through a paper ballot at pop-up events, libraries and more!
- Anyone in the city aged 11 years and older can vote, regardless of immigrant status
- This year: **139,688** ballots cast

Connect youths to seniors isolated due to ill health or citizen status to provide befriending services.

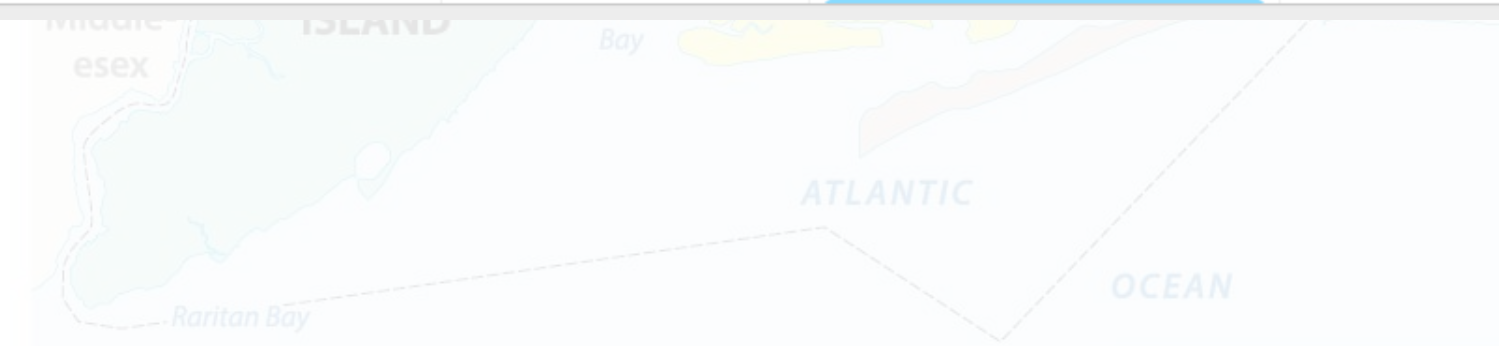

But it wasn't all smooth sailing. I observed 3 drawbacks of this model

1

Not enough scaffolding in Phase 1

Idea generation workshop was too short. Citizens may be experts of their lived experiences but need some scaffolding to create meaningful ideas



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Citizens might feel disappointed

Someone might feel strongly about an idea that doesn't make it to Phase 4 or the person who suggested the idea might not be awarded the proposal to implement it

Mechanism for idea sustainability is unclear

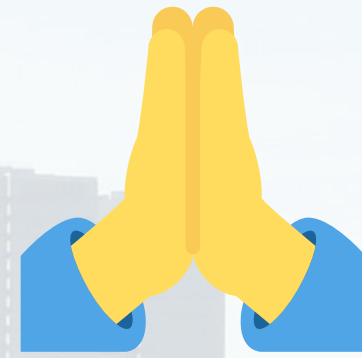

The CEC evaluated the success of Phase 1: Idea Generation using 6 indicators, collected through exit surveys and partner feedback reports
