

Process Questions:


- Who decides what will be done?

• What matters most to the community as good outcomes?














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Restoration of Community Building

1) "Communities are built at the pace of Trust" Authentic community building needs time to strike roots and bear sustainable fruits. Hence, funding and evaluation should have a longer time orientation, instead of quick shortterm results

Restoration of Community Building

2) A Social Compact where Institutions and the State play a catalytic role by enabling, rewarding, aggregating and funding community initiatives, instead of over-reaching or over-regulating.

Likewise, citizens must step up and claim the space to collaborate, contribute and shape

Restoration of Community Building

3) Failures are necessary - We learn wisdom and humility from things that do not work. Communities need time and space to learn and build our muscles to norm, "florm" (flop and storm) in order to perform
