"[L]ike you, my colleagues and I read with dismay that a recent survey conducted by Milieu Insight and published in The Straits Times (ST) on 14 June had reflected sentiments of about 1,000 Singaporeans that our arts workers are not essential at this time.
NAC did not participate in this survey and it would not be appropriate for us to question the methodology or the results. We did respond to a query from ST which was published in the follow up article on 16 June. We note this article had more details on their survey and carried
views from other key voices in the arts scene. Professor Tommy Koh, in capacity as the founding Chairman of NAC, strongly advocated for the value of the arts in an opinion editorial published on 18 June within a week of the ST piece on the survey.
Shortly, NAC will release the findings from the 2019 Population Survey on the Arts. [] When the survey is released, NAC's practice is to actively engage the media as necessary. The findings are reassuring to NAC and we hope that you too will find that the data affirms our shared
belief in the power of the arts. We recognise that there is still more work for us at the Council to build a deeper appreciation of the arts, and acknowledge that there will be significant challenges ahead in sustaining the gains that we have together achieved.[]
NAC has been actively engaging media partners over the past few months to profile the arts positively, and to commission works that create job opportunities for our artists and arts groups. Many of you would have enjoyed some of the heart-warming pieces that our artists have
been sharing in ST's column 30 Days of Art, presented in partnership with NAC. In the coming months, we will step up on advocating for the value of the arts, and leverage opportunities with key media partners including SPH across all language mediums.
I thank you once again for raising this issue with us, and hope that we will work closely together to deepen the public's appreciation of the vital role that the arts play in all our lives."


Then Covid-19 happened and with it, the lights went off in our museums, theatres and concert halls as performances were cancelled and exhibitions closed.


