

Population by Residency Status (000s)



Singapore's Total Population Profile (Percentage)


Population by Residency Status (%)

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New Residents (2)

- The immigration framework has been tightened since 2009.
- According to the latest *Population in Brief,* the number of new PRs granted has fallen from 59,460 in 2009 to 29,265 in 2010.




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Fertility Patterns






Resident Population by Age Group

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Future Population Trends (1): Raising TFR alone


Assumptions:

- 1. Closed population (0 migration)
- 2. Life expectancy at birth (2005-2050) rises from
 - 77.4 to 79.7 (males)
 - 81.3 to 84.6 (females)
- 3. TFR
 - remains at 1.24 births per woman throughout (Constant Low);
 - raised to 1.85 births per woman by 2030 and remaining constant afterwards (New Status Quo?)
 - raised to 2.1 births per woman by 2030 and remaining constant afterwards (Return to Replacement)






Total resident population declines under all scenarios, timing differs

Future Population Trends (2): Raising Net-Migration


Assumptions:

- 1. TFR remains constant at 1.24 births per woman throughout
- 2. 3 levels of net annual migration
 - 1. No migration
 - 2. 30,000
 - 3. 60,000
- 3. Life expectancy assumptions remain unchanged

Total Population





Working Age Population





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Integration Policy

- 1988: Social Integration Management Service set up under the Public Service Division, Prime Minister's Office
- 2009: National Integration Council and Integration Fund
- Model of managing new migrants?
 - Former DPM, Mr Wong Kan Seng's speech in Parliament, March 2010
 - National Integration Council





DPM Wong (2010):

- "We will ensure that those who become one of us ... not only contribute to Singapore economically but also integrate well into our society"
- "The success of the endeavour will, however, depend on the support and response of both newcomers and Singaporeans ... Integration is an ongoing journey and takes a long time. It cannot be rushed"



National Integration Council:

- "Social integration is necessarily a twoway process. Newcomers have the responsibility of learning about our multiracial society and culture, adapting to our social norms and internalising our core values. Locals should recognise the need for constant efforts at social integration to maintain a cohesive and united society"

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Integration Programmes

• The \$10 million Community Integration Fund (CIF) set up on 16 Sep 2009 provides co-funding of up to 80% of the total expenditure of projects or events that:

(i) Provide opportunities for new immigrants, foreigners and locals to interact and communicate with each other;

(ii) Improve their understanding of each other's culture, values and norms;

• For new citizens, a Singapore Citizenship Journey will be launched to enrich their understanding of Singaporean norms and values, and provide opportunities for meaningful interaction with the local communities.



Integration Programmes (2)

- Another national-level initiative is the People's Association's Integration and Naturalisation Champions (INC) programme. Our INCs reached out to over 30,000 new immigrants last year and organised grassroots events that brought them together with local Singaporeans. Their efforts have helped new immigrants to settle in, plug into the community and begin to build social networks
- NIC also encourages new immigrants to contribute to society through volunteerism. Participating in volunteer activities provides opportunities for personal engagement with locals, exposure to a larger cross-section of society and demonstrates a willingness to be involved in and contribute back to society.



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Concluding Observations

- Immigration is pertinent.
- Integration of new migrants is key in an increasingly diverse Singapore.
 - Policymakers need to be on guard and ensure that their initiatives do not favour certain groups over others, and
 - Ensure that their policies do not inevitably push migrant groups to create their own separate and exclusive communities.
