

Total	8.0%	9.4%	12.6%



Divorces with Dependent Children, 2008






Re-Marriages and Total Marriages

Local Findings on Child Development

Quality of Home Environment

- Characterised by the stimulation and support available to a child in the home environment
 - E.g. parental coaching in counting, reading, writing; participation in games, music & art
- Parental education & expectations for children's academic achievement related to providing high quality home environment
- Positive early home learning environment related to better academic & socio-emotional outcomes



Local Findings on Child Development

Preschool Experience

- Children who attended preschool more likely to be school-ready
- Children from private and non-private kindergartens, while controlling for income, did not seem to differ in school-readiness.
- Children who were very regular in attendance had better social skills
- Parent-child attachment not different in child care and kindergarten children, since role of mothers is similar for both groups of children

Enhanced Marriage and Parenthood Package (2008)

ComCare Self-Reliance & HOPE

Work Support Employment/ Work Support Self-Reliance	E.g. Monthly cash grant to meet basic needs, educational assistance for children, utilities assistance etc. Provide temporary relief for individuals and families in order to (re-)gain self-reliance	
Home Owner- ship Plus Education	Keep family small. E.g. housing grant, education bursaries, grant, mentoring support and cash grants. Invest in the children's future by helping families break out of the poverty cycle

Parent Education in Pre-school	Children taught positive family values and life skills. Parenting programmes and support group for parents.

Preschool Outreach [MCYS & MOE]	Help families with 5 and 6 year old children not attending pre- school Improve access to Pre-school Education		




Improving Childcare Quality

Raising Pre- school Teachers' Minimum	All new teachers to have 5 O-Level credits, including English, and a Diploma in Pre-School Teaching
Qualifications [MCYS & MOE]	Improve quality of pre-school education through qualification of teachers
Licensing Framework for Child Care Centres	Rigorous licensing criteria for childcare centres with varying tenures depending on the quality of their operations
	Improve quality of pre-school education by encouraging centres to strive for higher operating standards



Tax Incentives

Foreign	Lower maid levy of \$170 if employer has child or grandchild
Domestic Maid Levy	Ease cost of caregiving for married women who choose to remain in workforce
Parenthood	Income Tax rebates of \$5,000 to \$20,000
Tax Rebate	Encourage residents to have more children
Working Mothers' Child Relief	Tax relief of 5% to 25% of earned income
	Ease tax burden of women with children who choose to remain in workforce
Grandparent Caregiver Tax Relief	Tax relief of \$3,000 for working mothers
	Recognise grandparents for their contribution to the care-giving of their grandchild(ren)





Enhancing the Childcare Sector

- Between August 08 and 2013, 200 more childcare centres will be developed
- Since August 08, childcare subsidies increased from \$150 to \$300 monthly; infant care from \$400 to \$600 monthly
- From Jan 09, higher educational and professional requirements for childcare teachers
- Scholarships and bursaries for childcare teachers
- Funding scheme for eligible non-profit childcare centre operators to ramp up the supply of childcare places and set the benchmarks for quality and affordability.





- There is a need to continually update our policies on child development based on research and changing trends in marriage and parenthood.
- The Government is committed to supporting child development by strengthening families, easing cost of parenthood, and raising standards.
