

#### Introduction

The Institute of Policy Studies (IPS) conducted a telephone survey using the random sampling method based on landline numbers picked out of the Singapore residential telephone book.

The phone interviews were conducted by a third party survey firm, XpressWorks Pte Ltd for IPS, from 8 to 20 May 2011.

A total of 2084 interviews were conducted among Singapore citizens of voting age, that is, 21 years old and above.

The following survey instrument was used in the interviews.

The interviewer read out in information reflected in the Preamble of the document. The first step was to randomise the selection of the respondent by asking to speak to the person who is a Singaporean and last celebrated his or her birthday in the household.

When such a person come on the line, the interviewer then read out the background of the study and allowed him or her to make a choice about participating in the survey.

This is the standard practice by the industry in conducting phone surveys, and is also procedure required by the National University of Singapore's Institutional Review Board.

Out of the 2084 surveys completed, 5 cases were eliminated from the analysis because the respondents in those cases answered most of the items in an indifferent way (e.g. giving the same mid-range value in their answers) or because in some cases, many of the items were unanswered by the respondent.

The sample of 2079 was then weighted to match the distribution of Singapore citizens based on Census 2010 on the variables of age, gender and ethnicity, resulting in a weighted sample of 2080.
