## B. Present day - Building on our foundation.

B1 This is the third year of our conference series on "Transforming the Non-Profit Sector". Over the past 3 years, we have brought together leaders in the 3P sectors, to share ideas to transform the non-profit sector and take action for greater social impact.

- B2 We are all deeply invested in the future of Singapore and our society. We want to ensure that Singapore continues to thrive in the future.
- B3 The world today is going through a troubling period, politically, economically and socially. We need to recognise the gravity of the external situation we are facing. On the ground, Singaporeans are worried about bread-and-butter issues ahead, like the rising cost of living.
- B4 The Government has implemented a set of comprehensive support measures that will continue to be rolled out progressively. Tote Board as grant-maker will complement Government, to provide grants to support Singaporeans and our community.
- B5 One of our key signature grants is the Tote Board Social Service Fund (TBSSF) which provides longer term funding for over 70 programmes run by over 90 Social Service Agencies, serving over 360,000 clients. This includes vulnerable families, children and youths, the elderly, persons with disabilities and persons with mental health issues. These are all members in our local community who need support.
- B6 The Tote Board Enabling Lives Grant (TB ELI) supports the CAREconnect which provides resources and networks for emotional support. This enables caregivers to care for themselves even as they care for others. We understand the stress and strain that caregivers are under when they care for the elderly or persons with disabilities or others under their charge.

B7 Another example of our impact is our support for mental wellness. Through the Tote Board Social Service Fund, SAMH YouthReach (by the Singapore Association for Mental Health), a social worker reached out to Charlie\* who was unplugged from mainstream society, attending school sporadically and in poor physical and mental health. SAMH YouthReach helped Charlie to learn life skills such as setting reminders on his phone not to forget appointments and imparted skills to cope with suicide and violent thoughts, and to continually remind himself that these thoughts did not define him.

- C4 With the launch of the Fund today, Tote Board is further committed to ensuring the "future-readiness" of our society.
- C5 Tote Board's vision of "A Caring and Resilient Singapore" is something that no one single organisation or entity can achieve alone. To achieve "A Caring and Resilient Singapore", it is therefore important for us to re-imagine possibilities in our future space.
- C6 As an orchestrator, Tote Board is very proud to have brought together two leading institutions who are at the forefront of Singapore's futuring space:
  - (i) the Lee Kuan Yew Centre for Innovative Cities (LKYCIC), a research institute in the Singapore University of Technology and Design (SUTD); and
  - (ii) the Institute of Policy Studies (IPS), a think-tank at the National University of Singapore (NUS).
- C7 Together, with this new "Future-ready Society Impact Fund and Knowledge Partnership", we will collectively take an evidence-based, action-oriented approach in solutioning towards a future-ready society. Our partners have their leading strengths and will play a critical role in this partnership.
- C8 On behalf of Tote Board and our partners from LKYCIC and IPS, we are here to signal our commitment in working towards a future-ready and resilient society. We will ensure that our work is relevant and impactful in effecting positive social change in our communities.
